HECTOGRAPH MACHINE

We have recently acquired a hectograph machine for use in the school. It is a simple machine to operate,

The first step after the picture has been drawn, with a special pencil or ink, is to place the picture on a slightly moistened gelatin. After it has been left in this position for a few minutes it is removed, after which a clear imprint of the picture is left on the gelatin.

The blank paper is placed on this, and when it is removed it has the desired picture on it. This process is then repeated. There may be about fifty copies made of the picture. We have recently used it to make pictures in Art. I am sure this machine will help us very much in school work.
