

Class Flower: Pink Carnation



Another school year has come to a close. Like all others, it had its highlights and few reverses. The enrollment has been the highest in recent years, the close of school, sixty-two. We wish all pupils a happy summer vacation and God-willing, a grand opening in September with an equal spirit and eagerness for further training in God's Word. SCHOOL PROJECTS

STAMP DAYS: Stamp Day was held every Tuesday from the beginning of the term. A number of the pupils finished their books and converted into bonds. About \$4,50 worth of stamps were sold during the term. Those who bought stamps were given a special treat by the committee of the American Legion Auxiliary.

MILK FROGRAM: For the benefit of the children the Federal Milk Frogram was sponsored by the P.T.A. the past year. This project was started in February, and by the end of the term 145 gallons had been consumed. The milk was furnashed by the Sunny Ozark Dairy. The majority of the pupils took part in this program, since it was very cheap, being only 2¢ a cup. Pupils would purchase a card for a dollar which was punched regularly. At the close of the term the unused amount was to be returned. We hope to enlarge this program in fall to implude lunches.

PONIO DRIVE: This free-will contribution amounted to \$26.60. We feel that this shows generosity and kindness for such a worthy cause. We have been very fortunate that no one in our school has been afflicted with this dreaded disease. Most pupils of the first and second grade have received the initial inoculation in the G overnments program.

CHURCH OFFERING: The "Building for Christ" program was met with a fine response. The total offering of the School and Sunday School was about \$52.00. We know that this \$5,000,000 Offering was to help five important institutions not directly in Synods budget.
