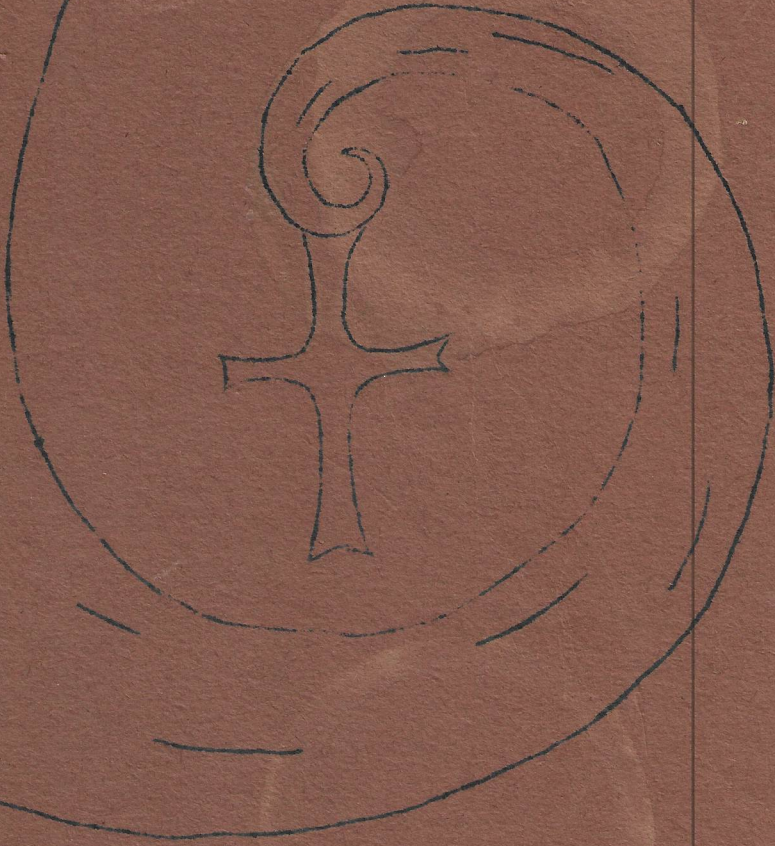

This was the dream, whether true or not, Anyway, we hope all the pupils of the eighth grade will be very successful, and very prosperous in life.

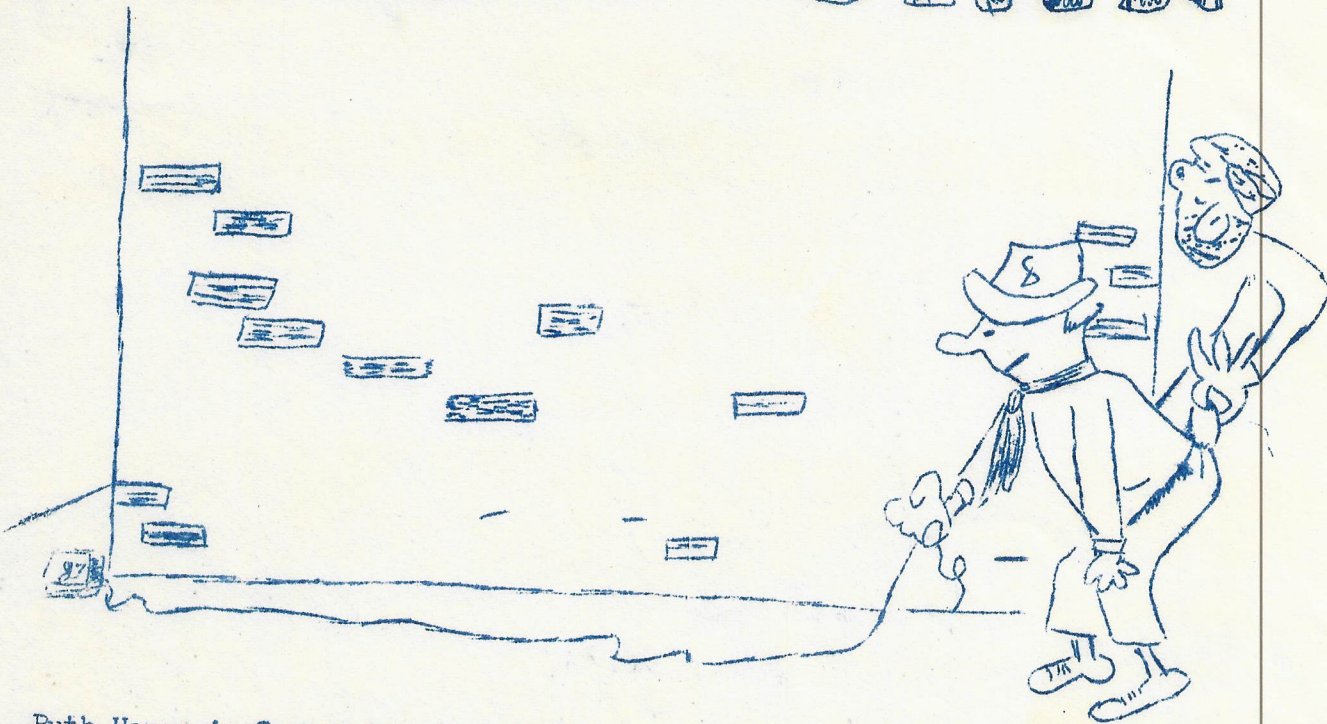

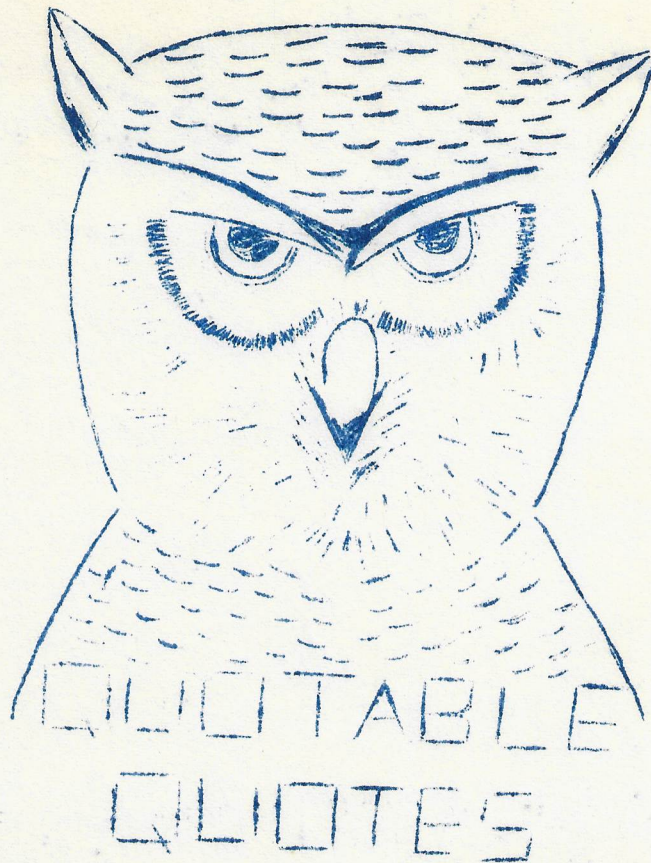
