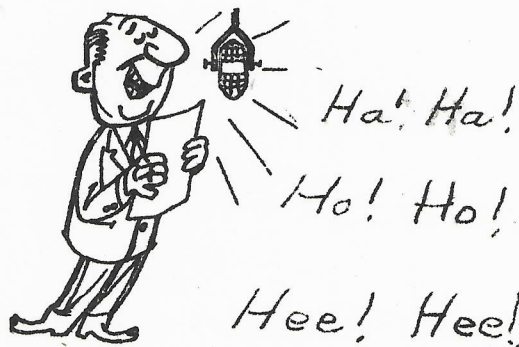
HUMOR OF THE SEVENTIES

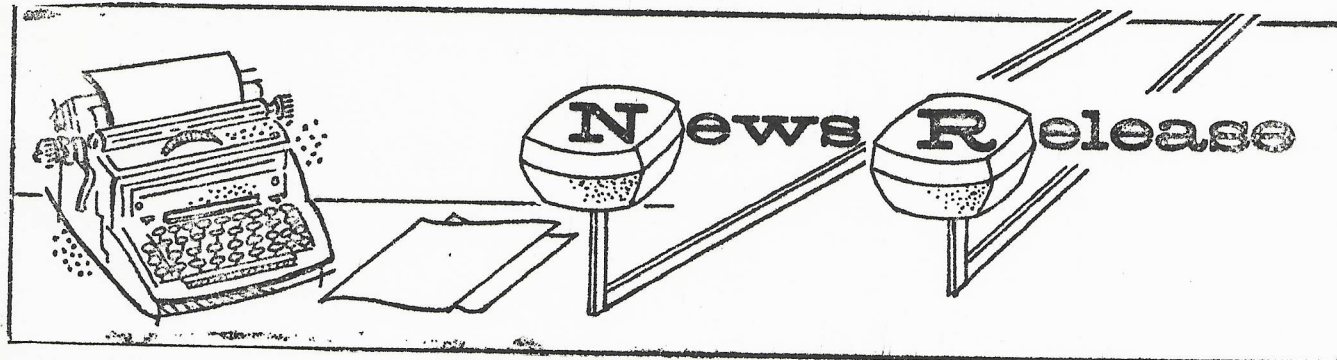


LUNCH PROGRAM
